


Alumni Luncheon

A street's more stylish sobriquet

A piece of Dallas history was buried when part of this road was renamed Clarendon Drive in 1931.

In 1879, James Bumpas established a country store in what is now West Oak Cliff. When he applied for a new post office the next year, Jamestown was already taken.

He opted for Jimtown, which became the settlement, then a sparsely populated farming community.

The heart of old Jimtown was Hampton Road and Clarendon Drive.

But by 1931, people wanted a more sophisticated label for Jimtown Road, which was renamed by extending the Clarendon Drive name.







I enjoyed your trivia page, especially as a lot of the items are very familiar to me, having lived in Angelton, the "Heart of Brazoria County" and County Seat for 44 of the last 51 years.

Lake Jackson, where jalapeno jelly was claimed to have been originated is 10 miles down S.H. 288; Velasco is now the northern section of Freeport and about 12 miles south; West Columbia is the "First Capital", 12 miles west and Alvin, where it rained 40+ inches in 24 hours is 22 miles northeast, all of these being in Brazoria County. Incidentally, it rained 20+ inches during the tropical depression. If you you have had the occasion to drive down Interstate 45 south of Huntsville, you may have seen the large statue of Sam Houston. If you haven't seen it you should make the trip. The same artist, David Adickes, is building a similar statue of Stephen F. Austin, which is being constructed in Angelton on S.H 288. History Trivia and Such of the days of old (the 1500's)



Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May, and still smelled pretty good by June. However,

they were starting to smell so brides carried bouquets of flowers to hide the body odor.

Hence the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting married.

Baths consisted of big tubs filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the other sons and men, then the women and finally the children. Last of all the babies. By then the water was so dirty you could actually loose someone in it.

Hence the saying;

"Don't throw the baby out with the bath water".

Houses had thatched roofs —thick straw — piled high, with no wood underneath. It was the only place the animals could get warm, so all the cats and other small animals (mice and bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained it became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying;

"It's raining cats and dogs".

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection.

That's how canopy beds came into existence.

The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something other than dirt. Hence the saying;
"Dirt Poor"

The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on the floor to help keep their footing. As the winter wore on, they added more thresh until when you opened the door it would start slipping outside. A piece of wood was placed in the entranceway. Hence the saying; "a thresh hold"

In the old days, they cooked in the kitchen with a big kettle that always hung over the open fire. Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. They ate mostly vegetables and did not get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner leaving leftovers in the pot overnight and start over again the next day. Sometimes stew had food in it that had been there for quite a while. Hence the rhyme;

"Peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine days old".

Sometimes they would obtain pork, which made them feel quite special. When visitors came over, they would hang up their bacon to show it off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could; "Bring home the bacon"

They would cut off a little piece to share with guests and all would sit around and "Chew the fat"

Those with money had plates made of pewter, food with high acid content caused some of the lead to leach into the food, causing lead poisoning death. This happened most often with tomatoes, so for the next 400 years or so, tomatoes were considered poisonous. Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle, and guest got the top, or "Uppercrust".

Lead cups were used to drink ale or whiskey. The combination would sometimes knock the imbibers out for a couple of days. Someone walking along the road would take them for dead and prepare them for burial. They were laid out on the kitchen table for a couple of days and the family would gather around and eat and drink and wait to see if they would wake up. Hence the custom of holding a "wake".

England is old and small and the local folks started running out of places to bury people. So they would dig up coffins and take their bones to a" bone- house" and reuse the grave. When opening these coffins, 1 out of 25 coffins were found to have scratched marks on the inside and they realized they had been buried alive. So they would tie a string on the wrist of the corpse, lead it through the coffin and up through the ground and tie it to a bell. Someone would have to sit out in the graveyard all night (the "graveyard shift") to listen for the bell. thus, someone could be "saved by the bell" or was a" dead ringer"

Now that's the truth.... Whoever said that History was boring.


Sunset Under Construction

When completed Sunset will boast 16 new classrooms, 5 art rooms, dance studio, drama room, band hall will be expanded, band storage room, music library, 4 computer labs, mechanical room, new central plant for electrical and cooling, repovation of old building, new air conditioning and heating, new rear entrance and plaza.

All construction is on schedule for completion by school opening in August, except for the parking lot. This is the area where portable buildings now stand. Paving will start when the portable buildings are removed.




Front of Sunset looking Southwest

The capture of Lee Harvey Oswald in the Texas Theater after the assassination of President John F. Kennedy cemented its place in history

When the theater is completed, it is expected to meet the needs of local artists for performance space and the needs of citizens for access to performing arts. In addition, it is expected to be available for lease for such activities as graduations, speeches and other local activities.
